- **Learning Outcomes:** This is a graduate-level course in modeling and analysis of time-to-event data. After completing the course, students will be

- able to recognize the various situations where time-to-event data arise and the specific characteristics of such data
- able to estimate the underlying event-time distribution using parametric or non-parametric methods and provide error bands on the estimates
- able to compare the event-time distributions of two or more groups
- able to develop and interpret prediction models for event-time based on other variables
- able to use statistical software to analyze such data
- prepared to read journal articles for research in this area

- **Topics Covered:**

1. Survival function, hazard function, cumulative hazard function
2. Common parametric models for survival data
3. Estimation of survival and cumulative hazard function: Kaplan-Meier estimator, Nelson-Aalen estimator and their properties
4. Regression models for survival data: accelerated failure time model, proportional hazards model
5. Censoring, truncation, construction of likelihood, partial likelihood
6. One-, two- and multi-sample tests for survival data: log-rank test, Wilcoxon test
7. Competing risk models
8. Use of statistical software in analyzing survival data
9. Time dependent covariates, counting process approach (if time permits)
